

Balancing Your Passion With Your Profession HOMEWORK FOR EPISODE EIGHT

To Recap

In Episode 7 of the Dauntless podcast, we heard from Jason Teeters and how he achieved success through one stepping stone at a time. For that episode's homework, we worked on how to identify your secret sauce. We looked at the different chapters in our lives, and pinpointed what each chapter gave us in skills and new knowledge. We're now taking that a step further.

In Episode 8 of Dauntless, Cory Stowers- a prolific artist and entrepreneur in Washington D.C. - described how he balances his passion with his profession. He's managed to create a wildly successful career for himself, while staying true to his creative calling.

How?

Cory said that a key to his success is that he's deliberately added skills to his repertoire, while looking at all the possible revenue streams associated with each skill. In that way, he's created a very robust toolkit. So for this episode's homework, we're going to build out your toolkit.

Your Toolkit

First, brainstorm your various skills. A good way to hone in on these skills is to ask yourself: What are you really good at? What are people constantly asking you to help with? What do you lose track of time doing? Maybe you have more or less than 10. And that's fine. Use as much space as you need.

- Create an online or in-person event and charge for registrations or sponsorships
- Start a consulting or coaching business where you teach others your skill

Next

Pinpoint one or two of the monetizing strategies that resonates the most with you. Which is the most feasible, given your available time and resources? Highlight it above. That's the very first step towards balancing your passion with your profession.

And if you're not interested in monetizing right now (or ever), that's fine! You can still think about the next step, which is adding to your toolkit.
